#### From the Pastor:

And as (Jesus) was praying, the appearance of his face was altered, and his clothing became dazzling white. And behold, two men were talking with him, Moses and Elijah, who appeared in glory and spoke of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Luke 9:29-31

#### THE TRANSFIGURATION

The season of Epiphany began with the account of the arrival of the Magi to offer homage to the newborn king, Jesus. During Epiphany, the Christ, the promised one of prophecy, is revealed to us as our Lord, the King of Kings, the very Son of God himself. His humanity is made clear in his baptism in the River Jordan, a tradition of the Jewish community of his time for repentance and confession of sin. Jesus, of course, had no sin; as

he came up out of the water, God declared from heaven that Jesus is his son, the beloved. Thus, his humanity is revealed in observing the human ritual of baptism, and his divinity is revealed through God's declaration of him as his son.

Throughout Epiphany, we have seen the revelation of Christ in scripture. On the second Sunday in Epiphany, John the Baptist declared, "I have seen and have borne witness that (Jesus) is the Son of God." God's declaration at Jesus' baptism is attested to by John, who came to prepare the



way for the Savior. The next few Sundays will show us how Jesus calls us, even in our uncertainty, to bring others to him; how he brings hope to the poor and oppressed; and how he has come to fulfill all law and prophecy.

The final Sunday in Epiphany is Transfiguration Sunday. Jesus is revealed to Peter, James, and John on the mountain with Moses and Elijah, representing the Law and the Prophets, who appear with him in his glory and foretell of his impending departure from earth. And the voice of God from heaven, as he did at Jesus' baptism, declared him as his Son, his Chosen One. Thus Epiphany, this season of revelation, is bracketed by God's declaration of Jesus as his Son at his baptism and as he stands with the two men of Hebrew scripture who epitomize God's presence with his people.

The disciples close to Jesus did not always realize who he was and what his mission was to be. They certainly did not understand how the one who came to save the world would die a brutal death on the cruelest instrument of torture of that time. They also did not understand that he would be resurrected from the dead after three days in a tomb. Although Jesus revealed himself in many ways throughout his life here on earth, those closest to him had only glimpses of who he was and how he was to accomplish salvation for all.

Two thousand years later, we certainly "know" more about who Jesus was, but we still seek revelation that goes beyond knowing, the revelation that comes only through faith. Faith is instilled in us by the presence of the Holy Spirit that comes to us in our baptism. It is not our knowledge of Jesus that saves us, it is that faith that moves us into the mystery of God as Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We may think that if we had been present at the Transfiguration, we would have believed and understood, yet we most likely would have had the same difficulty grasping the enormity of the mystery before us as the disciples did. As we enter the season of Lent next month, we will be reminded of the suffering of Christ in fulfillment of prophecy, his sacrifice as the Lamb of God who takes away our sin, a mystery that does not lend itself to human comprehension but must be instilled in us through faith.
