From the Desk of Pastor Weisner...

Dear Saints of the New Covenant Congregation,

You may have already heard me say in a sermon or other conversation, "there are realities around us that we cannot see!" (And if you haven't heard me say it yet, at some point, you will!)

Below is a story that I read recently by a journalist, Rod Dreher, a writer about politics and culture, who approaches his topics from an unabashedly bold Christian perspective. Here is his story....

The Ghost in The Hospital

Here's a story from Italy's *La Repubblica* newspaper, based on <u>an article in the *New England Journal of Medicine*</u>, written by John Guzzi, a surgeon who recalls what happened after he performed a liver transplant on a patient. An Italian friend sent me this translated version:

Day two after the operation. The liver transplant went well. The patient is lucid and humming a Pink Floyd song that John Guzzi, the doctor who is examining him, recognizes. The two, in a room at Yale University Hospital in New Haven in the United States, begin chatting amicably.

"Can I ask you a question?" the sick man asks. "That woman there in the corner of the room, she's not real, is she?" The doctor freezes. There is no one in the room but the two of them. The patient points with his finger toward the window. "She's there, short, middle-aged, tanned, with brown hair. She doesn't speak, but she seems kind. She has never left since I woke up."

The man has already talked to everyone about it. Nurses, family members, and other doctors confirm, "The patient is recovering very well medically, but he has the visions." They rummage through possible causes: some rare side effect of medication, the stress of the operation, a postoperative delirium, but the patient has a more logical explanation -- at least for him: "It's the donor. She knows I have her liver, and she checks that I'm okay."

The next day Dr. Guzzi attends the patient's course meeting with the surgeons. They know nothing about the ghost who is taking care of the transplant recipient. Dr. Guzzi takes the opportunity to ask what the donor looked like. "A petite, middle-aged woman with dark skin."

Dr. Guzzi cannot explain why his patient just somehow managed to see a person, invisible to all others, who matches the description of his organ donor. He simply assumes it must have been an illusion created by the patient to make sense of his life. Dr. Guzzi is imposing a silly materialist explanation to this narrative in order to protect his own interpretive framework for living.
