Easter Brunch Coffee Cake Recipe

Many of you asked for Dianne Hermanson's recipe for her delicious coffee cake. Here it is! Yummy Coffee Cake

Ingredients

1 cup oil1 cup sugar1½ cups brown sugar2 eggs beaten3 cups flour2 tsp cinnamon1 tsp vanilla3 tsp baking powder½ cup butter (melted)

1 cup milk Instructions

- 1. In large mixing bowl, combine oil, eggs, vanilla and milk together.
- 2. In medium bowl, blend together sugar, flour, baking powder and salt.
- 3. Combine egg mixture with flour mixture. Pour half the batter into lightly greased 9x13 pan.
- 4. In medium bowl, prepare streusel by combining brown sugar and cinnamon.
- 5. Sprinkle half of streusel on top of bater. Top with remaining batter and then sprinkle remaining streusel on top. (NOTE: I use only ¾ of the streusel in total.)
- 6. Drizzle with melted butter.
- 7. Bake, uncovered at 350° for 25-30 minutes.


